An App is in development which will give patients access to their personalised treatment plan and useful information.

Patients will be able to access the app with their mobile phone, tablet or pc.

Cancer Patient Registration

All cancer patients aged 0 - 24 years in Scotland are registered on the Scottish Cancer Registry for Children and Young People.

Information collected on the registry includes details of patients' diagnoses and treatments.

This information helps healthcare teams evaluate and improve services; it can also be useful for research.

Patients or parents can decide whether they agree to share details on the registry or not; if they have any queries they can get in touch with their doctor or with our network by using the Contact Form on our website.

Staff Education and Development

Our network has an active role in staff development and education; these are key priorities in the delivery of safe, patient-centred care. Annual educational events and staff study days are organised to enable sharing of experiences, knowledge and expertise.

We value feedback from patients, their families and carers. Feedback is collected through patient and family engagement, and through our website where people can get in touch using the Contact Form and Community Forum.



We use feedback to make improvements to the service, ensuring patients receive high quality care.
